

How to Get the Best out of Disposable Continence Products

Disposable continence products are very effective at containing bladder and/or bowel leakage, so long as they are the correct size and fit for the individual and they are used properly. This leaflet provides information on how to get the best use out of disposable continence products. However, you should always follow the manufacturer's instructions, which are usually on the side of the packet and available online. You should also follow any advice given to you by your healthcare professional.

Storage

Products are vacuum packed. It is better to keep them in their original packaging until about 24 hours before you are likely to need them. Take them out of the packaging about a day before you are likely to need them. This gives time for the fibres inside the product to expand and therefore work more effectively.

Store the products in a dry place, otherwise they will absorb some of the moisture from the environment and may work less well.

Applying the product

Follow the manufacturer's advice when applying the product. Most leaks occur because of poor fit, or problems with the way the product has been put on. There are instructions on how to apply the product on the packet. There are also videos online.

It is important to remember:

- To avoid using creams or talcs wherever possible. These will block the pores in the top sheet of the product and slow down the rate at which the urine can get into the product. This is why using them makes the product more likely to leak
- If creams are needed, they should be applied sparingly and rubbed in well
- Cup and fold the product before putting it on. This means that the product should be fully opened out and then folded in half lengthways. It should be given a gentle tug to activate any elastic. Check that, if there is any internal elastic, it is standing up at right angles from the product
- When the product is put on check that it is cupped through the groin area. This means that the product should be fitted snugly against the skin in the crease where the thighs meet the groin. It should be in a U shape through the groin. If the product is creased upwards as it goes through the groin, the urine will run off the

top of the product towards the elastic at the edges, before it can be absorbed and the product is more likely to leak.

One-piece products: it is important that the tabs are done up correctly as this improves the fit around the legs. Usually, if there are two pairs of tabs, the bottom pair of tabs are done up first. They should be an equal distance from the middle of the product and angled in a \land shape, pointing upwards. The top tabs should then be done up, but angled in a V shape, pointing downwards. The top tabs should also be an equal distance from the middle of the product. They may overlap the bottom tabs.

Two-piece products: it is important that self-adhesive products are worn with close fitting underwear. Products that are not self-adhesive must be used with correctly fitted fixation pants. These are usually supplied with the product. If they have not been supplied, then talk to your healthcare professional about what you should wear to hold them in place.

Changing the product

Most products are designed to contain more than one urination (wee). They have a oneway top sheet that is soft and has very small holes in it to allow fluid through. The urine is then locked away by a highly absorbent material in the core of the product. Once the urine is locked away in the core of the product the skin will remain dry. Odour protectors will prevent any smell. Therefore, products do not need to be changed as soon as they have some urine in them.

All adult-sized products have wetness indicators on the outside. Your healthcare professional will show you these. The wetness indicator becomes smudged or changes colour when the product is wet. Once half the wetness indicator is smudged the product should still contain a further full urination. The product should be changed if it is soiled (there is poo in it) or two-thirds or more of the wetness indicator is smudged or has changed colour.

Disposal of used products

Used products should be put in a bag and then placed in the dustbin. They do not need a special refuse collection if they are being used at home.
